Pastor's Pen...

March 5th marks the beginning of the season of Lent. Lent was created in the early church as a time for new believers to be instructed in Christianity and then officially join the church on Easter. Lent is about 7 weeks long and starts on a Wednesday known as Ash Wednesday. Since Easter is on a different date every year, that means that Lent and Ash Wednesday also move around.

Easter this year is just about as late as it can be on April 20th. Ash Wednesday is 46 days or about six and a half weeks earlier. Why 46 days? Well, it is based on the Biblical number of 40. This comes from Jesus spending 40 days in the wilderness being tempted. But doesn't that leave 6 additional days? Yes, this is because the Sundays in Lent do not count. The famous quote by Robert E. Webber says, "Every Sunday is a little Easter." Since All Sundays are holy and set aside, they do not count as part of Lent.

This leads us to the next question: What should we be doing on those 40 non-Sunday days between Ash Wednesday and Easter? Tradition says that we should fast just as Jesus did in the wilderness. A more modern take on the season is to give up something. Meat is one of the traditional things people give up. Other ideas include TV, chocolate, gambling, cursing, and such. I encourage you to give something up and then to add things like prayer, reading scripture, and sharing God's love. Use the time you would have spent on the thing you give up and use that time to intentionally grow closer to God.

Ash Wednesday got its name from the practice of spreading ashes on the foreheads of believers as a sign of the fast they were beginning. Traditionally, the ashes come from burning the

palm branches used in the previous year's Easter celebration. The ashes I use come from palm branches. The ashes themselves don't have a special meaning other than to be an outward sign of the spiritual work that is beginning on the inside. The celebration of Mardi Gras (French for Fat Tuesday) is named for the day before Ash Wednesday. Nowadays, Mardi Gras is a big party that can last days to weeks and is filled with everything that should be avoided during Lent.

We will have an Ash Wednesday service at 7pm on Wednesday, March 5th. This service always ends with placing ashes on everyone's forehead. Whether you are new to the faith or not, Lent is a time to focus on our faith journeys and earnestly work to grow closer to God. The Ash Wednesday service is a way to officially start and name that commitment on your part. I will also offer a brief time of receiving ashes directly after the Young At Heart Lunch that day for those who can not come back out in the evening.

The focus in worship this season will be the age old question of why a good God allows bad things to happen in the world. This question, more than any other, causes people to struggle with their faith. Over the 6 Sundays of Lent, we will discuss the scriptures, arguments, and their implications. The series is called Choose Love. I pray that during this coming season of Lent, both in worship and in your own daily lives, you will choose love as you grow in your faith.



School. First, people donated food items and money to the pantry. A grocery cart full of canned goods and \$158.00 in cash were collected in the Sanctuary during worship.

Second, on that Sunday, we held our annual "Soup"er Bowl Contest in Fellowship Hall. This year, we had 9 entries of delicious soups. As usual, there was a great variety of soups to be tasted. Each year, our cooks outdo themselves in making tried and true to unusual unique recipes. The cooks are the real MVPs of our contests. They donate their time and their soups to raise money for the pantry and so others can eat and fellowship. We thank all of them for their contributions as without them we could not have the contest.

Prayer Quilt Ministry Information and Interest Meeting Thursday, March 27th at 6 pm

I presented the idea of starting a Prayer Quilt Ministry at Sellersburg UMC at the February United Women in Faith meeting. There was enough interest to plan for a general meeting just about the ministry. For those of you who were not there, here's how a prayer quilt ministry works. In the beginning, a prayer quilt is just a normal, any size quilt/blanket made with love by people in the group. Multiple prayer ties/strings are then inserted into the quilt. The quilt/blanket is stored in a cabinet until it is requested through a form for a loved one who is in need of prayer and has agreed to receive it. The quilt is then presented in worship on a Sunday morning. After worship, people in attendance that Sunday are encouraged to say a prayer for the person who will receive the quilt while tying two of the prayer strings into a knot. Then the prayer quilt is given to the recipient by the person who requested it and they will explain that every knot in the prayer strings represents a prayer said by someone at our church.

It is a very meaningful ministry and a great outreach for our church. The backbone of the ministry is the people who will sew and assemble the quilts. While we definitely need some people with quilting and sewing experience to be involved; however, sewing experience is not needed as there are many steps that can be done without it. Plus we will need people who can manage the requests for prayer quilts/blankets and other logistics like collecting fabric donations and such. If you are interested in being a part of this new ministry, please attend the information and interest meeting on Thursday, March 27th at 6 pm. Mission Opportunities

Jesus Cares at Exit 0 Project



SUMC's Mission Team is supporting Exit 0 which is a Jeffersonville based ministry for the homeless and needy in Clark County. The website for Jesus Cares at Exit 0 states:

Exit 0 is a faith -based organization that has been serving the Southern Indiana area since November 2008, providing meals, resources, and addressing the basic human needs of the unhoused and low-income families in the region. Driven by a deep sense of compassion and a desire to follow the teachings of Christ and operates primarily on donated goods and has forged a valuable partnership with West Maple Baptist Church. At this church, Exit 0 offers an array of critical services, including the distribution of essential supplies, access to showers and laundry facilities, comprehensive case management, and the provision of meals twice a week, complemented by Bible study and weekly worship services.

Our Mission Team with the help of the congregation and our Young at Heart group will be assembling Snack Bags and Hygiene Bags for distribution by Exit 0 personnel. At our February meeting, the YAH group voted to begin to collect the needed items for the bags and to start assembling the bags at our March meeting. We will have our usual pitch-in meal and afterwards work together to assemble the bags. The help of the entire congregation is needed to collect the items for the bags. Everyone is invited to join the monthly YAH group or make snacks and/or hygiene bags on their own to donate to Exit 0.

The following items are needed for each **snack bag**:

A gallon size plastic bag, 1 can of meat (Tuna or chicken salad kits, potted meat, Spam, Vienna Sausage – pop top cans), 1 granola breakfast bar, 1 bottle of water, 1 flavored drink packet, 1 Pop Tart (Donuts, Little Debbies, Snack Cakes, etc.), 1 Slim Jim, 1 Variety Snack Bag (Chips, Gold Fish, Cheese Nips, Pretzels, etc.), 1 Peanut Butter Cracker or Cheese Cracker packet, 1 Fruit Cup* include plastic spoon or fork, 5 pieces of wrapped hard candy, 1 Pair of socks

The following items are needed for each **hygiene bag**:

A gallon size plastic bag, 1 Wash Rag, 1 Body Wash (2 in 1), 1 Bar of soap, 1 Deodorant, 2 Razors, 25 Q Tips, 12 Tampons, 12 Pads, 1 Toothbrush, 1 Toothpaste, 1 Comb, 1 Pair of Socks, 1 Travel size Lotion, 1 Travel size Hand Sanitizer, 1 Travel size First Aid Kit

In the Fellowship Hall, there will be totes labelled Snack Bags and Hygiene Bags in which people can drop their donated items or the bags which they have assembled. When we have enough finished bags to fill boxes, they will be delivered to Exit 0 for distribution. This will be an ongoing mission project for 2025, so donations will be needed all year.

We have the opportunity to be the hands and feet of Jesus for our neighbors in this mission project. We thank you for your support and donations.

ERTs provide a caring Christian presence in the aftermath of a disaster. ERTs help to prevent further damage to personal properties by tarping, removing debris, and cleaning out flooded areas. They offer both helping hands and hope to those in need.

ERTs must complete a one-day training that focuses on working with those impacted by disaster, procedures, and site safety. Once trained, they will be contacted when an ERT response is needed and can choose to help at that time or not. There is no minimum commitment.

Ever Consider online giving?

"What's the deal with the wooden box?" a pastor asked one of his long-time members of his church.

The answer opened his eyes to the historical and spiritual significance of the nondescript wooden box that many churches use to gather offerings. The box dates back to the beginning of the last century. Before the box, a committee from the church would personally, member by member, request gifts and subscriptions to support the work of the congregation. If you didn't follow up with the gift you had said you'd make, then you got a knock on your door reminding you of your commitment.

In 1900, the pastor of his church devised a better way. He proposed using this simple wooden box, in which the congregation could simply place their offerings each week. The church lived by faith, rather than compulsion, and the funds placed in the box would be divided by percentage for various ministries in the church. Today, many churches use budgets and offering plates. These contemporary methods of giving are rooted in the history of the old box plan of giving.

New giving methods are once again changing how people contribute to the work of God's kingdom and, as is usually the case, not everyone thinks this is such a great idea. Today some believe that the passing of the plates in a worship service is part of the service and continues to benefit the congregation as a way of thanking God for his many blessings.

While I believe this to be true, the spiritual benefits of digital giving can have a positive impact on a congregation. Churches must consider the practical aspects of a changing culture. We're a digital society; the church needs to have digital ways of giving.

Though digital giving methods are clearly practical, do they have a spiritual quality to them? In short, yes. Let me give you four spiritual benefits of digital giving.

1. Conviction

The Holy Spirit can convict a person at any time. If someone is convicted about being more generous at 11 PM one Thursday night and doing a second tier giving, online giving makes it easy to give to your church.

2. Opportunity

Digital giving methods open up more opportunities to give. Online giving provides you an opportunity to support the church even if you can't attend the worship service.

3. Prioritization

Have you ever forgotten to bring your checkbook to church? Or perhaps you thought you had cash on hand and you opened your wallet to find you forgot to go to the ATM and therefore you have none. When people use digital giving methods—such as giving to God through online giving, they can prioritize their giving. You never have to worry about forgetting to give in worship or when traveling catching up on a missed Sunday.

4. Regularity

Giving is an act of worship. It's also a spiritual discipline. Giving honors God's glory, thanks for His many blessings and requires regular effort. Through the use of automatic deductions, digital giving methods can help a person become more regular in generosity, not to mention the ease of setting it up and not having to worry about it.

Though I believe they are noteworthy, I don't want to overplay the spiritual benefits of digital giving tools. For centuries, the church has used a variety of methods, including wooden boxes. Giving is—ultimately—a heart issue. Whether you write a check, create an automatic debit, or use an online giving platform, God honors the generosity of a cheerful giver. Of course, you may also be glad the church clerk doesn't come knocking on your door demanding money like in the past!

Several families are taking advantage of online giving through ChurchTrac. Giving online is a good method if you cannot attend on Sunday. If you are interested in online giving, visit the church's website at sellersburgumc.com and click on the "Giving Tab" at the top of the page.
